IOM YEMEN ESTABLISHED OUTBREAK OF CONFLICT IN YEMEN CURRENT OPERATIONAL RESPONSE

Millions of people are experiencing alarming rates of acute malnutrition and food insecurity, and most of the population is in need of humanitarian assistance. Humanitarian needs are driven by the conflict, disease, a declining economy, and the breakdown of public institutions, and have been compounded by the COVID-19 pandemic. An estimated 160,000 people were reportedly displaced in 2021 alone as active frontlines shifted

and hostilities escalated in Ma'rib and areas along Yemen's west coast. Without a peaceful resolution of the conflict, the severity of needs and suffering is expected to worsen across the country in 2022. Despite the current crisis, migrants continue to arrive in Yemen, most hoping to find work in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. Many have become stranded in Yemen and experience abuse and exploitation on their journeys.

The International Organization for Migration (IOM) has well-established offices in Sana'a, Aden and Ma'rib and in 2021 opened a new office in Al Makha in the west coast region. IOM supports vulnerable groups throughout Yemen, including displaced people, conflict-affected communities and migrants. The Organization directly implements a multi-sector humanitarian response, namely health, water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH), shelter, non-food item (NFI) and cash-based assistance, camp coordination and camp management (CCCM), protection and displacement tracking (DTM). IOM Yemen's priority is to maximize the impact of its programmes for beneficiaries and ensure an accountable response.

WASH | WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE



Restoring and maintaining water and sanitation systems and providing WASH services to support the health and well-being of communities.

HEALTH



Expanding access to primary health care services and providing medical and technical support to static and mobile health clinics and hospitals.

TR | TRANSITION AND RECOVERY



Supporting the recovery of conflict-affected populations through rehabilitating and constructing vital infrastructure, enhancing livelihood opportunities and building local capacity to resolve community-level conflicts.

RMMS | REFUGEE & MIGRANT MULTI-SECTOR



Cluster lead. Providing life-saving, multi-sectoral assistance to vulnerable migrants, including voluntary humanitarian return (VHR).

PILLARS OF INTERVENTION



Meet humanitarian needs with lifesaving assistance

Implementing and coordinating lifesaving humanitarian response programming, focusing on immediate efforts to assist the most vulnerable individuals and communities.



Promote community stability by addressing drivers of conflict

Strengthening local conflict resolution capacities to reduce the level of conflict and build towards peace and sustainable recovery.



Enhance community resilience

Rehabilitating key public service infrastructure and supporting socioeconomic integration and capacity building opportunities.

CASH BASED INTERVENTIONS | CBIs

RRM sector co lead Supporting conflict-affected individuals through rapid CBIs to improve their access to basic services and food. Cash modalities are also integrated into various areas of IOM programming.



SHELTER & NON-FOOD ITEMS | S-NFI

Providing emergency and transitional shelter support and essential items to people living in displacement sites, collective centres and informal settlements.



CAMP COORDINATION & CAMP MANAGEMENT

Improving the conditions in displacement sites through site coordination, care and maintenance, as well as ensuring community participation.
