Humanitarian and development needs in Yemen are driven by the ongoing conflict, collapse of the economy, climate change, disease, and the breakdown of public institutions. Most of the population is in need of humanitarian assistance and an estimated 4.5 million people are internally displaced across the country – with high numbers of people displaced in areas near the frontlines in Ma'rib and areas along Yemen's west coast. Without a peaceful resolution of the conflict, the severity of suffering is expected to continue and undermine development gains made in the years prior to the fighting. Despite the current crisis, migrants continue to arrive in Yemen in hopes of reaching the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia to find work. Many have become stranded in Yemen and experience abuse and exploitation on their journeys.

The International Organization for Migration has well-established offices in Sana'a, Aden, Ma'rib and Al Makha in the west coast region which support vulnerable groups throughout Yemen, including displaced people, conflict-affected communities and migrants. The Organization directly implements a multi-sector humanitarian response, namely health, water, sanitation and hygiene, shelter, non-food item and cash-based assistance, camp coordination and camp management, protection and displacement tracking. IOM's transition and recovery programming also strengthens access to durable, life sustaining assistance that reduces reliance on aid and enhances self-sufficiency and peacebuilding in line with the HDP Nexus. IOM Yemen's priority is to maximize the impact of its programmes for beneficiaries and ensure an accountable response.


